THE ATHLETIC SPORTS.

THE sports were held up Fields on May 5 and 6 in perfect weather. The ground, however, was very hard and dry for running-shoes, and many discarded them for rubber. We had hoped to see M. A. THOMPSON break some more records this year, but, like so many others, he has a commission. In a good many events, however, the results show an improvement, the best performance undoubtedly being F. R. OLIVER'S Quarter Mile. It was unfortunate for both College and the School that F. E. D. HODGES was ill, but College are the more to be congratulated on their plucky effort to keep the House Cup, unaided as they were by a single Junior point. For their partial success S. L. HOLMES was to a certain extent

responsible in gaining the most points in winning the Mile and Half-Mile with Hurdles and getting second place in the Hurdles, but several others, notably P. L. LEIGHTON, assisted. The fate of the Cup was actually decided by the Mile, before which Grant's led King's Scholars by seven points. Thanks, however, to R. S. BROWNING'S determined and successful bid for the second place, the scores were equalised amid great excitement, and the Cup for the first time in its history will stay six months in College and six up Grant's. Both the Jumps were curiously poor, and in the Hundred Yards and Cricket Ball, though quite creditable performances were achieved, Thompson's standard of last year was not reached. Of the Juniors, N. A. MACKINTOSH was eminently successful, especially in the High Jump and Hundred Yards, and should do extremely well later on.

The O. T. C. provided a most efficient party, under Sergeant Brandon-Thomas, to hold the ropes and gave great assistance and satisfaction generally. There was, of course, no band, as all the proceedings were of a strictly business character, and the Head Master kindly distributed the prizes. We have to tender our usual thanks to Messrs. O. R. Borradaile, L. A. M. Fevez, R. T. Squire, and A. T. Willett for their exceedingly kind help; without them sports would not be sports at all for us. The Stewards were:—E. Davison, G. R. D. Gee, S. L. Quite a good race, the time being rather better than usual,

2.—THROWING THE CRICKET BALL. UNDER 15.

Buhler (Ash.), 1; Bate (Ash.), 2.

Distance, 71 yds. 1 ft. 5 ins.

Interest in this event was somewhat diminished by the fact all six who were left in were up Ashburnham. The winner, who was second last year, won with a moderate throw.

> 3.—HALF-MILE WITH HURDLES. OPEN. CHALLENGE CUP.

Holmes, S. L. (K.S.), 1; Leighton (K.S.), 2; Pulvertaft, R. J. V. (H.B), 3.

Time, 2 mins. 33 secs.

A very poor field entered for this race, which is, we believe, run at Westminster alone. Pulvertaft went ahead at once, and was not overtaken till late in the second lap, when Browning and then Holmes passed him. Browning fell at the second hurdle, but Holmes seemed to have no difficulty with them, and won easily. He might have run the laps quicker if he had been pressed, and the time is about the average. Leighton came in an easy second, followed by Pulvertaft, who had difficulty with most of the hurdles, falling more than once.

The winner jumped extraordinarily well, and though he was an inch below last year's height for this event, it is an excellent Junior jump. Buhler was some distance below, but proved a fairly easy second.

The winner had no science but much strength, and increased his distance with every throw. Jackson, who knew more about the game, was rather disappointing and did not reach Leighton's distance by nearly 10 feet.

Forster led off at a wonderful rate and was closely followed by Oliver till some way on in the straight, when a great race ensued, only a few feet separating the first and second. Julian came on at the beginning of the straight, and he and Robinson passed Mansbridge and Holmes, who were originally third and fourth. It was a fairly close race for the third place, but an easy second.

Bate was a fairly easy winner in the second-best time on record.

Waterfield, aided by his large start and a long stride, managed to keep in front the whole way round and win by about 10 yards. He should do well later on. Robertson and Powell both ran well for the second place. There was, as usual, a large entry.

15.—HIGH JUMP. OPEN. CHALLENGE CUP.

Record-E. O. Kirlew, 1894: 5ft. 71 ins.

Hewins (G.), 1; Neill (Ash.), 2. Height, 4 ft. 10\(^8\) ins.

The jumping in this event was about as poor as it was good in the Junior. It was with great difficulty that 13/4 ins. were added to the Junior height, and there was little to choose between the winners.

16.—HURDLE RACE. UNDER 15. FINAL. Mackintosh (G.), 1; Buhler (Ash.), 2. Time, 20\(\frac{3}{5}\) secs.

Mackintosh was the better hurdler and, in spite of his disadvantage in size, beat Buhler fairly comfortably. The time is $\frac{2}{5}$ sec. more than last year, which, however, was exceptionally good.

17.-100 YARDS. OPEN. FINAL.

Julian (H.B.) 1; Messinesi (R.), 2. Time 11 secs.

This required a second race, as in the first race for the final Julian and Messinesi dead-heated, with Oliver a yard or two behind. The time was 11½ secs. in the dead-heat, but in neither case was it as good as last year. Julian was about 1½ yds. ahead of Messinesi in the re-run.

18.—Long Jump. Under 15.

Buhler (Ash.), 1; Mackintosh (G.), 2. Distance, 15 ft. 6 ins.

A very good Junior jump. The winner should do well in this later on.

19.—HURDLE RACE. OPEN. FINAL.

Robinson, M. A. (K.S.), 1; Holmes, S. L. (K.S.), 2. Time, 19 secs.

As there was only one other in the final, Robinson and Holmes had little difficulty in getting both places for College, as in 1913. About 2 yards separated the first and second, and a like distance the second and third. The time, although an improvement on last year's, is not particularly good.

Salwey won with a few feet to spare in very fair time, though he had done better in his heat.

The distance was disappointing, as over 17 ft. had been reached in the trials. Julian was third.

Won quite easily by Mackintosh in the same time as last year.

All Greig's throws were ahead of the others', but Julian was a good second. A very creditable performance.

Salwey (G.), I; West, G. (H.B.), 2. Time, I min. 2 secs.

A good race, in which the second ran the first quite close. A fast pace was set at the first.

25.—ONE MILE. OPEN. CHALLENGE CUP.

Record—R. Tomlinson, 1863—4 mins. 50 secs. Holmes, S. L. (K.S.), 1; Browning (K.S.), 2; Oliver (G), 3* Time, 5 mins. 15 secs. About 30, as usual, entered, and the pace for the first lap was made by Pulvertaft, with Oliver well up. Browning went ahead in the second lap and passed Oliver. Towards the end of the third lap Holmes, who had been steadily coming up, passed Oliver. He was, however, content to follow Browning till half-way through the last lap, when he started sprinting and won easily by about 25 yards. Meanwhile a great struggle was in progress for the second place, Oliver gradually gaining on Browning, both going all they knew, but the latter just managed to get home a yard ahead.

The time is 8 secs. less than last year, but, as then, it might have been better had the winner been pressed.

The time is quite good, although a faster pace might have been set at the beginning.

FINAL.

Vistorical Note.

THE ninth volume of Hearne's Collections, just published by the Oxford Historical Society, says a good deal of various Westminsters, especially of Michael Maittaire. It is possible that but for Hearne some of the Town Boys whom he mentions would not be known to be Westminsters. These include the Hon. Benedict Leonard Calvert, a charming young antiquary, of whom much has appeared in the earlier volumes, Lord Charles Noel Somerset, Sir John Morgan, a Herefordshire baronet ('a very pretty hopeful young gent'), John Anstice, a son of the herald, who figures in the D.N.B., but without mention of his school, and Montagu Blomer. Hearne quotes from the Northampton Mercury, a newspaper still in existence, the following notice or the play :-

"London, November 23 (1725). On Friday night last (November 19) the youths of Westminster School performed the Play of Andrea in the Old Dormitory; where were present the Duke of Bedford, the Earl of Sunderland, and

many others of the nobility and quality."

Obituary.

PRO PATRIA.

FREDERICK ROGER JOHN TOMLINSON, Lieut., South Staffordshire Regiment; SIDNEY HERBERT FOSTER MURIEL, Captain, Border Regiment; WILLIAM BLENCOWE WELLS DURRANT, 2nd Lieut., the Rifle Brigade; RALPH DAVISON, Lieut., Northants Regiment; MAURICE DAY, 2nd Lieut., Berkshire Regiment; and RICHARD EDWARD JOHN THOMSON, Lieut., 15th Sikhs.

Mr. Tomlinson was the younger son of the Rev. Arthur R. Tomlinson, Vicar of Bolton-le-Sands, who was at the School from 1856 to 1862, and the nephew of the late Sir William Tomlinson, who also like his four brothers was a Westminster. Mr. Tomlinson was at the School from 1905 to 1910. He obtained a commission and went to the Front early in the war. In October he was reported missing. It is now known that he was wounded, and while he was on the way to the field hospital, was struck by a shot or splinter and killed.

Captain Muriel was the only son of the Rev. William Carter Muriel, Vicar of Fulham, and was at the School from 1891 to 1894. He went through Sandhurst, and obtained his first commission early in 1898. He served in the South African War, was wounded at Ladysmith, and mentioned in dispatches, and obtained the Queen's Medal with four clasps and the King's Medal with two clasps. He served as Adjutant of his Battalion, and obtained his Company in 1909. He fell near the Dardanelles on April 30.

Mr. Durrant was the son of Mr. Wells Durrant, Attorney-General of the Bahamas, and entered the School as a K.S. in 1908. In 1913 he obtained a Classical Scholarship at Magdalene College, Cambridge, and took a commission on the outbreak of the war. He went to the Front, and fell in France.

Mr. Davison was at the School from 1908 to 1912. He afterwards obtained a commission in the Devonshire Territorial R.E. and later a commission in the Northants Regiment. His younger brother is now a School Monitor.

A brother Officer wrote:—'He was killed gallantly leading his men in the attack on the German trenches. Out here he always behaved with the greatest pluck. I remember him especially at Ypres in November, when we were so hard pressed.'

Mr. Day was the youngest son of the Rev. B. W. Day, Rector of St. Peter's, Sandwich, followed his brothers to the School in 1906, and left at Election 1909. On the outbreak of war he enlisted in the London Regiment, and afterwards obtained a Commission.

Mr. Thomson was the son of Lt.-Col. S. J. Thomson, C.I.E., came to the School in 1906, and left at Election 1909. He went through Sandhurst, obtained his Commission in 1911, and saw active service at Nowshera and Loralai.

We add notice of three Officers whose deaths were recorded in our last number:—

Major LABERTOUCHE was at the School from 1886 to 1888. In 1892 he obtained a commission in the Suffolk Regiment, and was afterwards transferred to the Indian Army. He saw active service on the North-West Frontier in 1897–98, and obtained a medal and clasp, and in China in 1900, obtaining the medal. He fell in action near the Persian Gulf.

Mr. Summerhays was the younger son of Mr. T. C. Summerhays, Alderman of the County of Surrey, and brother of the Secretary of the O.WW. Cricket and Football Club. He was at the School from 1902 to 1908. He served his Articles, but on the outbreak of the war enlisted in the East Surrey Regiment. He soon got a commission in Queen Victoria's Rifles, with whom he saw nearly six months' service at the Front.

Mr. Kellie was a son of Mr. Laurence Kellie, the well-known singer and composer. He was at the School from 1909 to 1912. He enlisted in the London Regiment, and afterwards got a commission in the Bedfordshire Regiment.

We have also to regret the deaths of Sir Ernest Northcote, lately a Governor of the School, Mr. Robert Drummond Balfour, the Rev. George Grey Wilkinson, and Captain Royston Cecil Gamage du Plessis Le Blond.

Sir Ernest Augustus Northcote was at the School from 1864 to 1869, when he was elected to Trinity. He was called to the Bar in 1875, and in 1882 became a Stipendiary Magistrate in British Guiana. In 1886 he became a Puisne Judge in Jamaica, and from 1903 to 1908 was Chief Justice of Trinidad and Tobago.

Mr. Balfour was at the School from 1857 to 1859, and became a scholar of Magdalene College, Cambridge. He played five years in the Cambridge Eleven, and also for Gentlemen against Players at Lords. Afterwards he became a Stockbroker. Four of his nephews were at the School between 1887 and 1893. He died on May 7.

Mr. Wilkinson, the younger son of the late Bishop of Truro, was at the School from 1874 to 1877. He went to Pembroke College, Cambridge, graduating in 1890. In 1891 he was ordained to the curacy of St. Peter's, Eaton Square, and some time since was appointed Priest in ordinary to the King. The Boys' Mission and Club, which he managed in St. Peter's parish, was well known as one of the best in London. He was himself the Captain of the Cadet Corps, and was taken ill at the King's Review on May 15. He was removed to St. George's Hospital, and died there.

Captain LE BLOND came as a K.S. in 1901 and left in 1906. He held a commission in the 12th Battalion of the Rifle Brigade, and died in Camp on Salisbury Plain in May.

His Colonel wrote to his home :-

'British Expeditionary Force.

'MY DEAR MR. SUMMERHAYS,—It is with the most profound regret and distress we tell you that your boy has given his life for his country, being killed yesterday morning. He died a hero's death on Hill 60, having taken his men forward to assist Major Lees who was gallantly holding a crater against tremendous odds; he was killed close to Major Lees, and instantly, being hit by a bomb on the head. It is perhaps some consolation to know that his superbly gallant conduct has kept the above hill, from which the enemy dominated our positions, entirely in our hands, and we have been able to make the position good and can now hold it I trust to the great advantage of the whole army. I cannot tell you in any way adequate what a loss he is to the Regiment and myself, his many sterling qualities and his devotion to duty endeared him to one and all of us; indeed, it was their love for him that prompted his men to follow him and stick to him to the last. The whole night through they fought on and on and stuck to their leaders who so heroically led them.

'You must forgive me if I have been blunt or curt in writing this, but I have just come through a big strain, and am still surrounded by the incessant noise of heavy artillers.

'We of the Regiment will never forget the superb example set us by your son, and can only hope when our time comes to try to emulate his heroic behaviour and utterly unselfish patriotism.
